Antarctica, on average, is the coldest, driest, and windiest continent, and has the highest average elevation of all the continents. Antarctica is considered a desert, with annual precipitation of only 200 mm (8 inches) along the coast and far less inland. There are no permanent human residents, but anywhere from 1,000 to 5,000 people reside throughout the vear at the research stations scattered across the continent. Only cold-adapted plants and animals survive there, including penguins, seals. nematodes, tardigrades,

mites, many types of algae and other microorganisms, and tundra vegetation. Belief in the existence of a Terra Australis – a vast continent in the far south of the globe to "balance" the northern lands of Europe, Asia and North Africa has existed since the times of Ptolemy (1st century AD), who suggested the idea to preserve the symmetry of all known landmasses in the world. Depictions of a large southern landmass were common in maps such as the early 16th century Turkish Piri Reis map. Even in the late 17th century, after explorers had found that South America and Australia were not part of the fabled "Antarctica", geographers believed that the continent was much larger than its actual size. European maps continued to show this hypothetical land until Captain

James Cook's ships, HMS Resolution and Adventure, crossed the Antarctic Circle on 17 January 1773, in December 1773 and again in January 1774.

Half Moon Island is a two-kilometre long (1.2 mile), crescent-shaped island in the shadow of the picturesque mountains and glaciers of nearby Livingston Island. It is a favoured expedition stop for its large chinstrap penguin rookery. Other than a short hill, walking is generally easy. The serrated and crevassed cliffs are also home to Antarctic terns, kelp gulls, snowy sheathbills, and

Wilson's storm petrels. Landings are usually made on an easily accessible, wide beach where an abandoned dory lies decaying. Once up the hill, there are magnificent views of Livingston Island and humpback whales have been spotted breeching in the water between the two islands. Down towards the western end of the beach is Teniente Camara station with its huge Argentine flags emblazoned on the orange buildings. The station has been sporadically staffed in recent years due to the Argentine economy. This will be our only opportunity to see chinstrap penguins in significant numbers.

The Antarctic Convergence is the where the warmer waters of the north meet the colder, denser, less saline waters of the south. As the colder water sinks beneath the warmer, a mixing occurs that brings nutrients to the surface. Found between 40°S and

60°S, the convergence is an ever-changing frontier. It is the biological limit of the Antarctic ecosystem and anywhere south of the convergence is known as the Antarctic Ocean.

While there is often a low fog in the area and an increase in wildlife, other than using a thermometer, there is no way to know when you are crossing it; the seas do not get rougher and the water color does not change. The waters of Antarctica circle the continent in the world's biggest ocean current at an estimated rate of 150 million cubic meters per second. Once carried far into the northern oceans, the dense polar water has a cooling effect on tropical and temperate waters and is important to the oceans' balance.

A natural haven created by a one kilometre-long (0.6 mile), curved spit; Yankee Harbour on Greenwich Island is so well situated as to appear manmade. Named for the American sealers that frequented here in the 1820's, remnants of the era linger and a sealer's trypot can be seen on the beach. Elephant, Weddell, and fur seals are common sights on the beach and the main attraction is a terraced gentoo colony numbering around 4000 pairs. Nearby Glacier Bluff offers a dramatic backdrop and on a clear day, one can see across the McFarlane Strait to Livingston and Half Moon islands. The gravel beach affords easy walking but can often be windy and cold. Be careful of extensive moss beds and nesting skuas and fur seals. Be sure to keep your eyes on the spit during the polarCirkel boat ride in; it is a

favourite spot for elephant seals to haul out.

A portion of the wall of the volcanic caldera of Deception Island has collapsed, flooding the interior and creating an amazing natural harbour known as Port Foster. Access to the interior is through the 200 metre-wide (660 feet) entrance known as Neptune's Bellows. There is a rock in the middle just under the water and the area to one side is foul. Therefore the ship will have merely 100 metres (330 feet) with which to navigate. Once safely through the Bellows, Whalers Bay will begin to appear off the starboard side of the ship.

Telefon Bay on the northwestern side of Port Foster is named for a salvage vessel that moored here in 1909, awaiting repairs. From a wide, flat beach, a black ash apron slopes gently upward and inland for about 985 feet (300 meters) t the steep face of the cinder-covered volcanic glacier and a crater from one of Deception's recent eruptions. The rising slope of the black, cinder-covered volcanic rim can be walked uphill to spectacular view point.

Wilhelmina Bay: The mountains and high glacier walls of the Antarctic Peninsula around Wilhelmina Bay ensure that there is plenty of dramatic scenery, interesting ice in the water, and the possibility of witnessing a calving. Enterprise Island in Wilhelmina Bay has the partially submerged wreck of the whaling ship Guvernøren near Foyn Harbour. The 3433 ton ship caught fire in 1915 and was run aground in order to rescue men and supplies. There were no fatalities. The bay is a choice feeding place for whales and therefore was a choice hunting ground for whalers. As Shackleton was marching his men across the ice of the Weddell Sea. his final destination was to be Wilhelmina Bay where he anticipated whalers could be found for rescue. As well as the possibility of whales, Weddell, crabeater, and leopard seals can be found here and Antarctic terns nest on some of the bare cliff faces.

Andvord Bay penetrates deep into the Antarctic Peninsula; from here the Weddell Sea side is a mere fifty kilometres

(30 miles) away. Once inside the bay, one is surrounded on all sides by the mountains and alpine glaciers of the peninsula. The bay is splendidly scenic and fills with castellated icebergs and wildlife in the long days of the summer.

Nestled at the bottom of the bay is Neko Harbour, named for a whaling ship which anchored there in the early 1900's. It is one of the rare places in the Antarctic Peninsula area where one can come ashore on the Antarctic mainland. Hike up the hill to the penguin rookery and an amazing view of Andvord Bay but do not continue onto the glacier as it is heavily crevassed. The glacier across the tiny harbour is very active and creates very impressive but dangerous waves when it calves - please stay off the beach.

Cuverville Island supports one of the largest known gentoo penguin colonies. This can be apparent from miles away given the right wind direction. Early in the season, snow cover impedes but doesn't stop penguins accessing their nests and an intricate network of "penguin highways" is carved into the snow. The shallow waters between Cuverville and Rongé islands often trap and ground icebergs. This makes for superb ship-cruising through the channel. Up from the

rookery at Cuverville, steep cliffs lead to the island top. These cliffs should be avoided so as not to damage the mosses and lichens that grow there. The cliffs are also home to skuas that are vigorous in defending their well-hidden nests.

Port Lockroy: during Operation Tabarin in 1944, the British set up two bases in the Peninsula area to establish a permanent presence in the Antarctic. They set up Base 'A' at Port Lockroy, a known safe anchorage. Base 'B', was established at Whalers Bay, Deception Island. The base at Port Lockroy was operational until 1962 and then fell into disrepair. Since its restoration in 1996 by the Antarctic Heritage Trust (AHT), Base 'A' on Goudier Island at Port Lockrov has become one of the most visited sites in Antarctica. It now operates as a museum, kept as it was in the 1950s, as well as a post office and souvenir shop with all proceeds going to the AHT. a non-profit organization dedicated to conserving this and other historical huts in Antarctica.

At the northern end of the Lemaire Channel are two tall, rounded, and often snowcapped peaks at Cape Renard: Una's Peaks, also known to Antarcticans as Una's Tits. They were so named by members of the Falkland Islands Dependencies Survey (today's British Antarctic Survey) in honor of a secretary in the Governor's Office in Stanley. capital of the Falkland Islands. She was the last woman they would see before sailing south.

The Lemaire Channel was first sighted by Eduard Dallman in 1873 and then charted and traversed by Adrien de Gerlache in 1898. He named it for Charles Lemaire, a fellow Belgian who explored the Congo for King Leopold III. Given the right weather, this eleven kilometre-long (seven mile) and 1.6 kilometre-wide (one mile) channel can be strikingly beautiful. The steep cliffs and glaciers of Booth Island to one side mirror the opposite shores of the Antarctic Peninsula. When protected from the wind, the clear waters offer an extraordinary reflection of the mountains in the water: there can appear to be four different sets nudging each other. So many camera clicks can be heard during a traverse of the Lemaire Channel that it is known by expedition staff as the "Kodak Crack". Navigation of the channel is dependent upon ice conditions but one doesn't need to travel all the way down to experience its beauty.

The Gullet is a narrow channel that separates Adelaide Island from the west coast of Graham Land. The twisting channels somehow resemble a digestive tract and are full of ice most of the year. It separates Hansen and Day Islands, and connects the

heads of Hanusse Bay and the Laubeuf Fjord. It was first explored by Charcot.

The Antarctic Circle is one of the five major circles of latitude that mark maps of the Earth. It lies at latitude 66° 33' 40" south of the equator. The area south of the Antarctic Circle is known as the Antarctic, and the zone immediately to the north is called the Southern Temperate Zone. The equivalent line of latitude in the northern hemisphere is the Arctic Circle. Along the Antarctic Circle there is one day each year during which the sun does not set, about December 21 (the summer solstice, first day of summer in the Southern Hemisphere). Similarly, the sun does not rise above the horizon on approximately June 21 (the winter solstice). The number of days without sunset or sunrise increases with proximity to the South Pole. At the Pole there are six months of continuous darkness (about March 20 to September 22) followed by six months of daylight (September 23 to March 21).

Horseshoe Island 67°50 S 67°12 W Well below the Antarctic Circle, the Marquerite Bay was discovered by Charcot on his 1909 French Antarctic Expedition and named for his second wife. When Charcot married Marquerite in 1907, he secured from her the promise that she would never object to any of his future dreams of Antarctic exploration. She later ioined him – at least until Punta Arenas in Chile. This extensive bay is situated on the west side of the Antarctic Peninsula which is bounded on the north by Adelaide Island and on the south by Wordie Ice Shelf, George VI Sound and Alexander Island, Islands within the bay include Porquoi Pas Island, Horseshoe Island and Lagotellie Island.

Horseshoe Island; occupies most of the entrance of Square Bay, on the west coast of Graham Land. It was discovered and named descriptively in 1936-37. Horseshoe Island (Base Y) is an important example of a mostly unaltered and fully equipped British scientific research station of the 1950s. It was established in March 1955 by the Falkland Islands Dependencies Survey as Base Y, and was closed in August 1960. Scientific research carried out at the station was topographic survey, geology and meteorology. Extensive survey trips, often covering hundreds of miles and lasting several months, were undertaken from the station using dog sledges. The normal occupancy of the station was 4 to 10 people. The site consists of the original main building (which was extended in 1956 to include a sledge workshop and extra bunk space) a balloon shed, dog pens and an emergency store. Inside, the station contains almost all of its original contents, fixtures and fittings, including kitchen utensils, stocks of food and fuel, workshop tools, radio

equipment and a diesel generator. The excellent condition and completeness of both the buildings and artefacts are of considerable historical significance as together they provide a very special "time-capsule" of British life and science in the Antarctic during the late 1950s.

His ship Pourquoi Pas wintered in a tiny cove on Petermann that Charcot named Port Circumcision. There is a cairn and plague from the expedition on a hill near the ship's old anchorage. There is a 1950's era Argentine refuge that in recent years has been kept up and visited regularly by the staff from Vernadskiy, the nearby Ukranian base. Vernadsky was British Base Faraday until 1996. There is a cross commemorating three men from Faraday who were lost on the sea ice trying to return from the island to the base in the winter of 1982. Adélie penguins, Blue-eyed shags, and the world's southernmost Gentoo penguin

González Videla Base, on the Antarctic mainland's Waterboat Point in Paradise Bay, is named after Chilean President Gabriel González Videla, who in the 1940s became the first chief of state of any nation to visit Antarctica. The station was active from 1951-58, and was reopened briefly in the early 1980s. It is now an "inactive" base, with fuel and supplies in storage in the buildings for

emergency use, or in case the base were to be reactivated in the future. Occasional summer visits are made by Chilean parties and tourists. On the north edge of the station there is a sign identifying Waterboat Point as an official historic site under the Antarctic Treaty. This was the place where the smallest ever wintering-over party (two men) spent a year and a day in 1921-1922. The two men, Thomas Bagshawe and M.C. Lester, had been part of the British Imperial Expedition, but their particular project, which involved flying a number of aircraft to the South Pole, was aborted. Nevertheless, they decided to stay over for the winter and made their shelter in an old whaling boat they found on this site. Their time was not wasted, however, because Bagshawe wrote the first scientific study of penguin

Gonzalez Videla 64°49 S 62°52 W breeding development. And today the gentoos, probably descendants of the ones he studied, nest in the ruins of the whaleboat shelter.

The Melchior Islands are a series of low rocky islands in Dallmann Bay in the Palmer Archipelago. The snow-topped islands are pondered by waves from the Drake Passage, and the rocks have been sculpted by the wavy action. They were first seen but left unnamed by a German expedition under Eduard Dallmann, 1873-74. The islands were re sighted and roughly charted by the Third French Antarctic Expedition under Jean-Baptiste Charcot. 1903-05. Charcot named what he believed to be the large easternmost island in the group "Île Melchior" after Vice Admiral Jules Melchior of the French Navy.
